APD 251 Fashion Studio I: Garment Construction

Section 1 = Tuesdays & Thursdays 2:30-4:45pm

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Office: 213 Stone Building. Office hours = Mondays 12:45-2:15pm and T/R 1:30-2:15pm. Scheduling an appointment ahead is strongly advised.

Course Description: Assembly methods for and evaluation of ready-to-wear apparel including terminologies, production techniques and price/quality relationships.

Course Objectives: Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Identify appropriate garment assembly techniques for specific fabrics, markets and pricing categories and apply correct ones to assigned projects.
- Execute various assembly techniques in different types of apparel.
- Plan the apparel assembly process for different garments based on analysis of ready-to-wear samples.
- Become familiar with basic VStitcher functions for 3D visualization of garments.

Text: No required text. Reader's Digest Complete Guide to Sewing is recommended. Manuals for the sewing machines and sergers are on Canvas.

Required Supplies: Presser feet, needles, bobbins, and bobbin case for Juki machines; fabric shears; straight pins; hand sewing needles; unbleached muslin 100% cotton for samples (4 yards minimum); at least 1 yard fusible lightweight interfacing for samples; two all-purpose polyester or nylon 7" zippers; other various sewing supplies; fabric, thread, and notions as directed for each project (note: projects will require specific fiber types and fabric constructions – be prepared to order fabric on-line or go beyond Greensboro to get the necessary materials); you will need to print some patterns yourself; other supplies as needed for special projects.

Teaching Methods and Assignments for Achieving Learning Outcomes:

- This course is taught in a studio format. The studio portion of the class requires a hands-on approach for a better understanding of the subject matter. Demonstrations will give students direction for individual time spent analyzing and assembling garments. In class time will be devoted to working under the direct supervision of the instructor.
- Sample assignments will be included throughout the course. Knowledge gained in the first project will carry over into each successive project.
- Some in-class and outside of class time will be devoted to working in Stone 127 using VStitcher.
- Students will also be expected to make frequent observations of various apparel products for research.
- Should the University go fully remote at some point this semester, students will still be required to sew garments, even remotely.

Technology Requirements:

- Robust internet connection
- Computer or tablet with audio and microphone capabilities
- Latest Chrome browser recommended
- Ability to access Stone 127 computers during non-studio class time.

VStitcher log-in: You will soon receive an email from Browzwear directing you to create an account for VStitcher use. You must respond to that email <u>quickly</u> to be able to log into VStitcher for class.

From the University Catalog regarding attendance:

Regular class attendance is a responsibility and a privilege of university education. It is fundamental to the orderly acquisition of knowledge. Course Regulations:

- 1. Dependent on your level of sewing proficiency and your ability to learn skills, an average of 8-12 hours of work <u>outside the class</u> per week may be necessary. *See the UNC Greensboro University Catalog, Suggested Academic Workload Guidelines.*
- 2. Attendance, punctuality, and productive participation are required. Absences will have an effect on your final grade. Two tardies &/or early departures will count as one absence. For each absence after three, the final course grade average may be reduced 3 points. Your participation grade will also be influenced by your attendance. Excused absences require documentation, and an excuse is something **beyond your control.** **Absences for religious holidays and certain university functions (like an athlete participating in a game/match) will be excused, but students are expected to notify me at least two weeks prior to the planned absence and work due may be expected to be turned in before the planned absence.

*Note: I reserve the right to drop a student from the course after the student has missed more than 50% of the class meetings to date and/or had three (3) successive absences – excused or unexcused.

- 3. Students are expected to attend class with all tools, fabric, and other materials needed for the assignment at hand and with any relevant homework. As failure to come with materials and/or homework results in no meaningful work being done, it will be treated as an <u>unexcused absence</u>. Class time is to be used for current assignments.
- 4. If a student misses a class, it is the student's responsibility to get the assignment from Canvas or a fellow student. It is also the student's responsibility to get notes on missed demonstrations. Demonstrations will not be repeated. Class time will not be spent catching up students who miss class it is not fair to take that time away from the students who attend.
- 5. Assignments and projects will **not** be accepted late, nor will they be accepted incomplete. (To clarify if an assignment is due at start of class, or 2:30pm, then it is late if turned in one minute late, or at 2:31pm and will not be accepted. If a garment requires a hem and doesn't have one, it's incomplete. Exceptions will only be made for students with documented emergency excuses. When a student misses an assignment due date because of an emergency, the student should show the instructor what work has been done on the due assignment upon returning to class in other words, don't come back to class empty handed.
- 6. Making up missed exams/project due dates: Only students with documented emergency excuses will be allowed to make up missed exams. Students should be prepared to take the missed exam upon their return to class. There will be online quizzes.
- 7. No food or beverages in the sewing labs (Stone 368 and 369) at any time.

- 8. Turn cell phones to "manner mode" or off while in class and refrain from texting or talking on them during class. Do not wear earphones to listen to music, audio, etc. during class. Try not to watch my tutorial videos during class. They are for your reference when you are not in class.
- 9. Put your personal belongings in your locker and **not on the work tables**. The department is not responsible for anything left in the lab. Do not leave drapes on the dress forms.
- 10. Unannounced / "pop" quizzes may happen at any time.
- 11. Know and follow all design studio rules (posted in studios and on Canvas).
- 12. Figure out parking and/or transportation so that you are on time to class and can remain in class the full time.

Course Evaluation:

All work completed for this course will meet the minimum requirements of the UNCG Honor Code. **All work submitted for this course must be <u>new work</u>, and cannot have been submitted for credit in any other course including this one.** Your grade will be based on University Guidelines; refer to *The UNC Greensboro University Catalog*. DO keep in mind that "excellent work" requires independent thinking and that to receive this grade, you must bring qualities to your work "above and beyond" those expected by this program.
