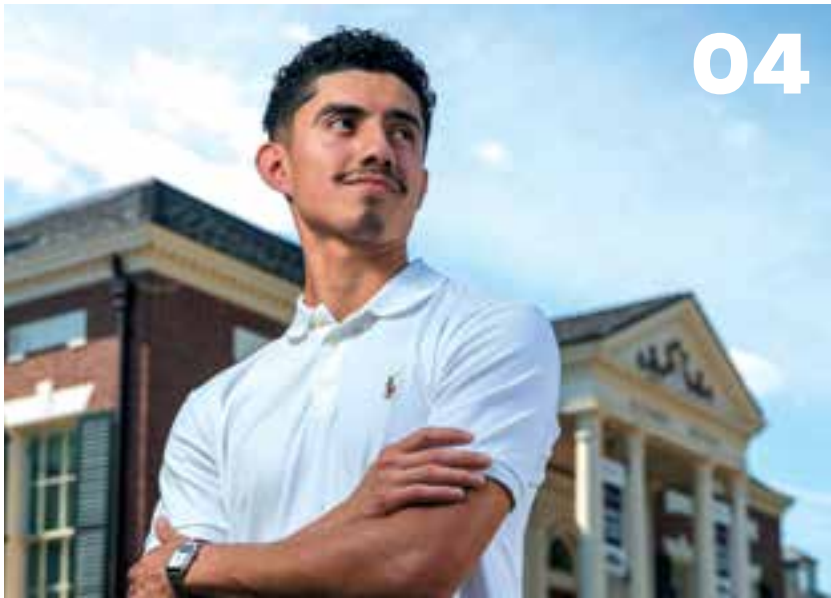
Thank you for your unwavering support and commitment to our shared vision. I will cherish the memories we have created together at various luncheons and School events and carry them with me always.

A SENSE OF Belonging

In high school Juan Lopez Delapaz '24 (Economics) would never have imagined he'd be graduating from college with a business degree.

"I was really quiet, nervous and wanted to stay in my room," he says. "Fast forward to this school year, and I'm involved in campus, have made friends, have grown professionally, have genuine interests and am not afraid to speak in public. I'm amazed and grateful."

Delapaz's LinkedIn profile shows just how engaged he has been at UNC Greensboro's Bryan School of Business and Economics.

What made such a transformation possible? Delapaz cites a few things: the scholarships he received from the Bryan School, the support of its faculty and staff, the university's commitment to diversity, and a campus association for young Latino professionals. Now, as the first man in his family to graduate from college, he hopes to parlay his economics degree into a career in the banking industry.

While Delapaz initially imagined becoming a delivery driver like his father, his older sister encouraged him to take dual-enrollment classes at his Texas

high school and then apply to college. Delapaz received a scholarship to play soccer for a college in eastern Kentucky, where he spent one year. But when his family moved back to North Carolina, he considered making a change.

On a tour of UNCG's campus, he and his mother felt an immediate connection. "The first thing we noticed was the diversity, and I saw many people with my skin color," he says. Then, they met with Margarita Kerkadó, a Senior Assistant Director in undergraduate admissions who is bilingual. They found her to be genuine as she related to many of the struggles Latino parents and first-generation college students often face. "Knowing that people like her are here on campus provided me with a sense of support," he said. The family was so impressed that his sister, Vanessa, is now at UNCG as a nursing student.

Assistance also arrived in the form of scholarships, including the Albert S. Keister Economics Scholarship and the Iris Taymore Schnitzer and Stephen M. Schnitzer Scholarship. "Just having that financial stress lifted off my shoulders felt good," Delapaz said. "I could actually study and retain the lessons I

was being taught without having to worry how I was going to pay off the tuition."

The financial help enabled him to seek out many opportunities, with staffers saying he attended just about every professional development program the Bryan School offered. At Kerkadó's recommendation, Delapaz was hired as a Spartan Guide giving campus tours, and he has served as a mentor to Latino high school students considering higher education.

But the most impactful change came when, at the urging of several staff members and professors, he joined UNCG's chapter of the Association of Latino Professionals for America (ALPFA).

"At first, Juan wasn't really sure he could succeed in business," Kerkadó recalls. "I think this generation and our (Latino) kids especially can sometimes feel this 'imposter syndrome.' But then he found ALPFA and the professors here also recommended he join, and now he is such a leader. We pushed him hard and now he is doing a lot of things. He has grown so fast with the Bryan School."

As treasurer of ALPFA, Delapaz continued to build his network, help with fundraisers and attend national career-related events. In January, he attended a Bank of America business certificate program in Charlotte, alongside fellow ALPFA students from UNCG and across the country, learning critical thinking, communication, customer interaction, conflict management, and policy-making and presentation skills.

PAYING IT **FORWARD**



There is a women's college basketball coach with a popular motivational speech about facing life's challenges. "Life will never get easier," the speech goes. "What happens is: you handle hard better." Steve Scott, a local businessman who is a part-time lecturer at the UNC Greensboro Bryan School of Business and Economics, likes to quote this speech in his classes.

He also believes it offers an apt description of his student Sydney Arnao (Finance).

As a first-generation college student, Arnao has overcome significant obstacles not only to learn and succeed at the Bryan School but also to mentor other students who follow her. Through her role as a team leader for Scott's Business 115 class: "Blueprint for Personal Development," Arnao had the opportunity to share her knowledge and confidence to inspire and guide younger undergraduates. Today, many of them stay in contact with Arnao, who is now a senior, to seek her advice, request references or thank her for helping them secure internships.

"We call it the family tree," Scott says. "Sydney's success is becoming exponential."

Today, Arnao balances her classes with a highly sought-after, paid internship for Volvo Group. She has been named a University Marshal for her commitment to academic excellence and service. And she says her success and her dreams for a future career are possible because the scholarships she's received have opened the doors to higher education.

"I know that if I hadn't received a scholarship, I would not be in school," she says. "As someone who grew up questioning my safety net, for the first time I had a sense that I didn't need to worry about finances."

Growing up in rural Guilford County, Arnao saw the impact poverty had on some of her family members. She attended the Middle College at UNCG for high school and, from there, decided to apply to the university. Once accepted and enrolled, she found the academics to be manageable and she was willing to learn all she could. But, she says, she had little understanding about everything else needed to graduate and secure a job.

"I didn't even know what an internship was. I had no clue what a corporate job was," she says. "It was all new to me and knowing how to navigate all of that was extremely challenging."

Mentors and professors like Scott, who is CEO of Tri-State Steel Products, have provided advice and helped to point her in the right direction. Having a scholarship also gave her the financial breathing room to dive fully into all the Bryan School had to offer. For instance, the funds enabled her to live on campus so she no longer had a long commute, and she qualified for student health insurance. "I could get involved in clubs, look for an internship and focus on my schoolwork because now I could pay for my groceries or have new clothes going into the school year or be able to fill up my gas tank."

Arnao joined the Spartan Investment Club, learning enough to take first place in the club's stock market competition. Eventually, she applied to be treasurer of the Student Government Association, and she now oversees its finances and helps allocate money. When student groups make budget requests, they share their passions and present the changes they want to make at UNCG and in the world.

One of her goals is to merge her interest in finance with her minor in sociology to open a financial resource center for women, specifically those coming out of poverty or facing socioeconomic challenges. She wants to serve women in rural areas, which may not have the resources that cities do. Learning to manage money, maintain credit, or pursue home ownership could make a huge difference for women who are facing deep challenges such as abusive relationships or poverty.

She knows she has come far since starting at the Bryan School, and is grateful for the scholarships that have made that possible, including her most recent award from the Independent Insurance Agents of North Carolina Scholarship Fund.

Scott, who has watched her transition into the leader she is now, has no doubt she'll continue to succeed. "The question is not whether Sydney is going to be great," he said. "The question is: What does Sydney want to be great at? I am so proud of her, and I am confident that the legacy she is leaving will be measured for years and years after she is gone."

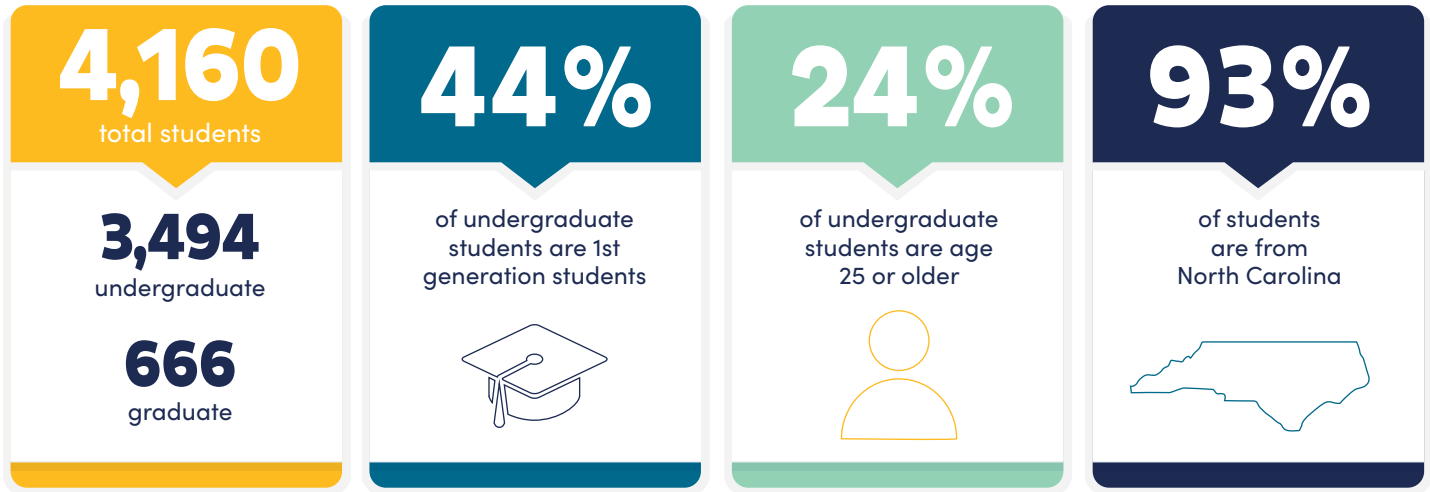

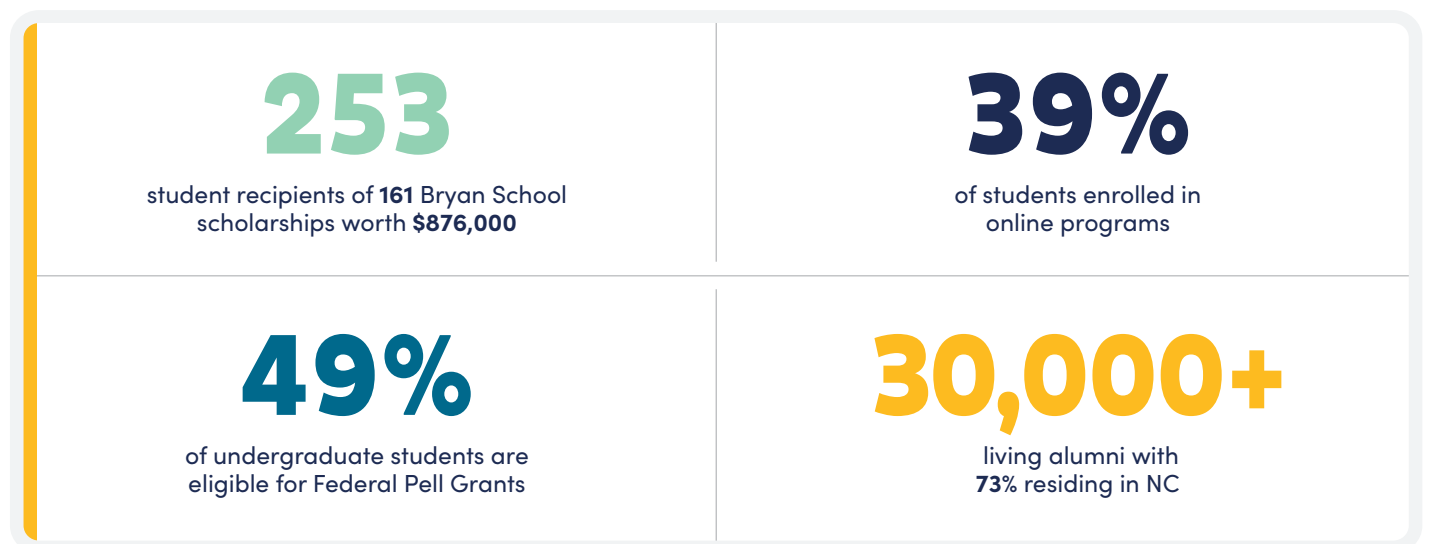

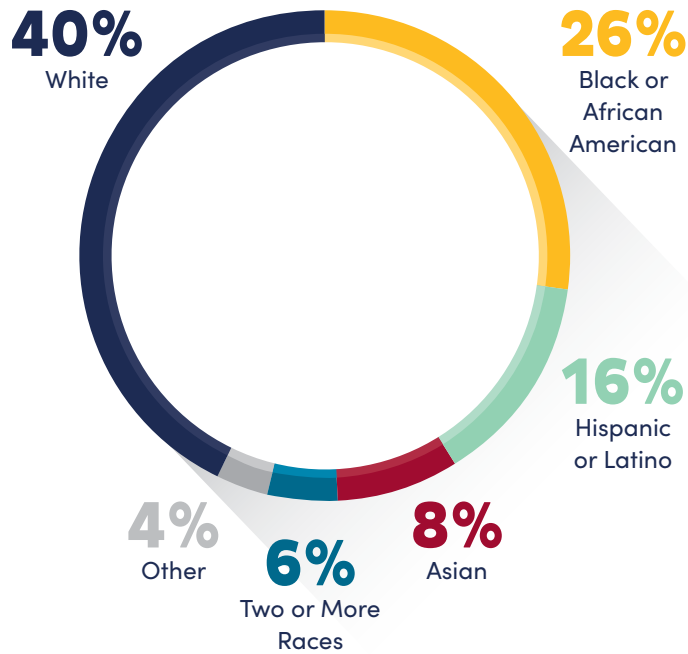
